her art lesson from the back of the classroom. Well done staff and students!







Student Safety

With the weather changing and roads becoming more slippery, it makes it harder for cars to stop more suddenly. We ask that you talk to your children about road safety. The safety of our students and families is extremely important.

Story Time Holiday Spectacular

Try out these tips over the holidays to make story time with your child more spectacular!

- 1) Tell your child a story while out on a car trip and ask them what their favourite part of the story was and why.
- 2) Ask your child to read a book to you, both draw your favourite scenes, and then explain the drawings to each other.
- 3) Sing your favourite song to your child and ask them what story the song is telling.
- 4) Read a book to your child. Ask them what adventures might happen next to the main character when the book is done.

- 5) Ask your child to share a simple picture book with you and to tell you a story based on the pictures.
- 6) Get family members to tell a story about their day around the dinner table. Ask your child to repeat back the main points of the stories in their own words.
- 7) Gather 3-5 random items from around the house (e.g. stuffed animal, bowl, pen, TV remote, running shoe, fork) and ask your child to tell you a story that includes all of the items.
- 8) Take a walk with your child around the neighbourhood and tell each other stories about the people who pass by. Where might they be going? What could they be doing? Make up fun details to tell interesting stories.
- 9) Read one page of a book to your child and pause before you start the next page. Have them guess what happens next. Continue this until you're done the book. 10) Have your child walk across the room 5 times. On each trip, call out something new they are doing and ask them to tell you a story about it (e.g. walking

through snow to school; walking in the forest; going

down the aisle of the grocery store).

From the ESL Department

Ways to use storytelling to increase literacy skills in our students...

Families can tell traditional stories from their background or country of origin. These can be traditional family stories, fairy tales or folktales. The first telling allows children to pick up details of the story, the second telling lets them connect and clarify those details, and the third telling builds a deeper understanding and reinforces memory for their own retelling. Each retelling offers yet another opportunity for children to delve deeper into the story and learn something new.

Invite active participation by telling stories with repetitive words. This encourages children to listen attentively by leading them to anticipate the next word. This is often fun for children. This attention to sounds and phrases not only makes the story interactive, it also develops phonemic awareness, which is the ability to identify and tell the difference between each sound.
